MEMO IN SUPPORT April 27, 2009

A7573--To protect the environment and public health by prohibiting the manufacture, process or distribution of the brominated flame retardant decabrominated diphenyl ether (decaBDE).

One in seven New Yorkers has a Learning Disability. A learning disability is a neurobiological disorder, meaning there are differences in brain structure and/or function in a person who has learning disabilities. These differences lead to difficulty in learning.

Exposure to environmental toxins is the single largest preventable cause of learning disabilities. DeceBDE is one of the hazardous substances prevalent in the environment. Research indicates that that it can cause permanent neurological and developmental damage including deficits in learning, memory and hearing, changes in behavior, and delays in sensory-motor development. This legislation would prohibit the continued sale of deceBDE in products and thereby help to reduce contamination of the environment with this neuro-poison.

The impact of learning disabilities on our society and culture is enormous. Over half of the detainees in Juvenile detention facilities have a learning disability. Up to 60% of adolescents in treatment for substance abuse have learning disabilities. 48% of those with learning disabilities are out of the workforce or unemployed. 50% of females with learning disabilities will be mothers (many of them single) within 3-5 years of leaving high school. 44 percent of the TANF (welfare) population were found to have a learning disability. 31% of students with learning disabilities will be arrested 3-5 years out of high school.

While the mission of LDANYS is closely associated with advocacy for appropriate supports and services for persons with learning disabilities, we also strongly support policies and practices that help **prevent** learning and other developmental disabilities. This legislation will take an important step towards the prevention of such disabilities by helping to remove hazardous toxics from the environment. The Learning Disabilities Association of New York State therefore supports this bill, and urges that it be enacted into law.
